

President Roosevelt fought hard to build the Armed Forces through the Selective Service Act. Many politicians opposed this draft, claiming that it was possible to negotiate with the Nazis. The House of Representatives renewed the Selective Service Act by only one vote. It encouraged youth to see celebrities like film star Jimmy Stewart in March 1941 volunteering for the U.S. Army. He later became a war hero.
