

Night by Elie Wiesel Interactive Extension Activity

Overview

Help students understand the historical context of *Night* by following HHC staff on a tour of the museum. The tour highlights the experiences of Elie Wiesel and local Holocaust survivors. Students will analyze excerpts from *Night* along with primary source testimony, photographs, and artifacts from the museum.

The recorded tour features exhibits in the museum that relate to the book *Night* and our sequence of the chronology of Wiesel's story as it appears in the book. We have also included stories of local survivors to connect Cincinnati to the global history of the Holocaust.

The tour can be shown in segments or in its full length. Included is a PDF with text, photographs and links to history and testimony clips made for the museum. It can also be used as a PowerPoint.

Enrich your students' experience further by adding <u>Echoing Voices: Unpacking History</u>. Students unpack the story of a local eyewitness from a suitcase, creating a human connection with the past. Suitcases include video testimony, photos, and artifacts, with suggested activities. It is available digitally or in a suitcase for pick-up. We also have a local <u>survivor biographies</u> activity and a <u>timeline activity</u> you can use as well.

<u>Cincy Upstander Project</u>: Learn how to be upstander by using your 24-character strengths. Upstander Activity Boards provide short lessons on what it means to be an upstander, while learning and exploring your own strengths.
